WMAF Florida Regional Gathering



Forty people met in Brooksville, Florida, March 13, 2018 for the Florida region annual meeting of Wesleyan Missionary Alumni Fellowship. The group included 8 former MK's, 3 of whom became GP career missionaries.

John Croft gave an inspiring presentation on the Jesus Film Partnership. He now serves as Managing Director (non-travel). The goal in 2012 to plant 300 new churches has now reached to over 750. From 10 countries in 2012, the Wesleyan Church is now involved with 24 countries. There are 48 trained teams, 31 of which are self-

supporting. Campus Crusade provides the Wesleyan teams with all their equipment.

In the afternoon John Croft spoke of his new challenge in Port St. Lucie, to "Restart" Crosstown Fellowship Church. God is working in the church and community, and expanding opportunities for outreach.

Ryan Hansard, Brooksville Wesleyan Church's Outreach and Missions Pastor, reported on his recent 4-day trip to Puerto Rico. He and Rev. Josue Perez delivered hurricane relief funds from BWC to the Wesleyan District and to Wesleyan Academy. This was an informative introduction for our church to the Wesleyan work in Puerto Rico.

Dan and Martha Duda spoke of their 30-year ministry to the Seneca Nation on the Cattaraugus Reservation in western New York, cultural adjustments, and spiritual battles and victories. They had previously served as missionaries in Zambia. They retired last November and live in Wesleyan Village.
