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Wesleyans Respond to Ebola

The dreaded disease of Ebola continues to spread in West Africa. We are deeply grateful for the efforts that The Wesleyan Church and associated faith-based relief and development organizations and individuals have made to assist the peoples of Sierra Leone and Liberia.

The Wesleyan Church has made an appeal to Wesleyans to give to the Wesleyan Emergency Relief Fund as a means of helping in this dire situation.



World Hope International is providing supplies to Kamakwie Wesleyan Hospital (KWH) and clinics, education through group training with villages, churches and community health workers, and educational posters and radio broadcasts.

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One individual with a deep connection and heart for Sierra Leone carried out a mission that brought great hope and appreciation from the local people. They said of her, "True friends come when there is trouble and don't run away from us." Carrie Jo Cain, a nurse from Minnesota, took supplies to KWH and was there for two weeks to train staff and help out. Carrie Jo is the daughter of Don and Joan Kinde, former missionaries to SL. She speaks the local language and understands the local culture. As you can well understand, this is huge! She and her husband, Geoff, and daughter, Rebecca, have recently been appointed as GP missionaries to KWH.

The humanitarian organization of the Liberian Wesleyan Church, CHOPE (Community Hope), has been very active in educating the people of Liberia in safer practices during this crisis.

Both the Liberian and Sierra Leonean Wesleyan Churches have risen to the occasion to help out their communities in this desperate reality.

Dr. Samuel Justin, the emeritus national leader and founder of the Gujarat Regional Conference of The Wesleyan Church in India, was ushered into the presence of the Lord on Sunday, September 28. He was 90+ years old.

Dr. Justin was an outstanding servant leader. He pioneered and took the Gujarat Conference from its humble beginnings to where it is right now—a strong, independent, self-sustaining conference led by committed pastors among one of the least-reached ethnic groups in the world. The Gujarat Wesleyan churches are reaching out to their Gujarati communities and beyond.

In recent years, the churches in this area of India have faced significant opposition. Dr. Justin lived openly, courageously, winsomely representing Christ to all. His example in the forefront of all the Wesleyan pastors and lay people of the Gujarat Conference will be greatly missed.

All-India Pastor's Conference



A Wesleyan All-India Pastor's Conference was held October 11 to 15 for the three regional conferences with eighty-six delegates attending. Dr. Dennis Jackson, Rev. Ben Ward, and Dr. Romy Caringal represented Global Partners to lead the seminars. Everyone enjoyed the warm fellowship, good food, nice accommodations, seminars and presentations. Learning from and getting to know each other and praying together gave us a new sense of unity. Convinced that we should hold such a conference on a regular basis, several proposed that we should meet every two or three years to further strengthen our ties. This has been a dream for many of us serving in India, as uniting our leaders fosters stronger relationships and binds the diverse groups of people under the Wesleyan banner. Each delegate had a traveling story to tell as the majority came from afar, some by plane, others by train, some by bus or by foot, and some on the road for almost 48 hours before arriving. "Best Practices" were shared from each conference so that we could learn from each other. Primary and secondary schools are significant platforms of ministries in two of our regions, with local communities benefitting from the high quality of our educational institutions. We worshiped on Sunday in a local Wesleyan church that uses a rented facility that may soon lose their lease. They have purchased a new property and hope to begin the foundation for a new building in January 2015. They have a strong faith and trust in the Lord to supply their needs. More than 200 attended the closing rally that included observance of the Lord's Supper. Though many of us met each other only for the first time, the bond of love in Christ simply overwhelmed all of us. We were so blessed to be in the house of the Lord that day!

"Dora, a bright girl in the choir, had been very sick. She had developed severe headaches and became very thin and unable to go about her daily activities. I was so happy to see her back in church last week. We believe she is suffering from malnutrition and lack of proper diet. She has unusual spiritual perception and very often talks to us about the spiritual concerns in her life. Please pray for her."
