Back to the Philippines

Paul and Jean Walborn first arrived in Manila, Philippines on June 1, 1965 to begin "An Incredible Journey" in missions. A year before, Paul had graduated from Owosso Pilgrim Bible College, (Owosso, MI) and pastored a church in California. With their 3 children - Greg, Jerry, and Doug, they joined a missionary team guiding Filipino believers in a national church started by Filipinos in the early 1930's.

A Philippine church Discipline had been structured and districts were organized across Luzon and Mindanao. Three Bible colleges existed and Paul and Jean would eventually teach in all three. Paul spent many months compiling and documenting the growth of the church across the Mindanao area and published it in 1981, "Enabling Growth in the Local Church." The fundamental answer for that remarkable growth consisted in following webs of relationships in society and families. In 1981, Walborns assisted in opening a new work in Cebu and a new district developed.

By May 1989, the national church had advanced to become a full General Conference, electing its own officers, providing for the support of workers, and evangelizing/planting churches throughout the islands. The philosophy of national church development gave no place for missionary presence, so the Walborns returned to the USA. They started a Filipino church in the Portland. OR area and pastored there 10 years. In 2002, Paul and Jean went back to the Philippines to teach at Rosales Bible College for two years. While there, they arranged for a Northwest District Work & Witness team to come and help with the construction of a new men's dorm. After a short visit to the USA, they returned to Cebu in May 2005 to lay the ground work for a new Bible college for the Visayan language people. Again, a Northwest work team came to help with construction.

Thus began a home again, Philippines again odyssey that runs until today. Paul and Jean would make two trips alone to help with the Cebu and Palawan college construction projects, and the Northwest work team would make 10 trips to the Philippines - 3 times to Cebu, 3 times to Palawan, and 4 times to Rosales. This last trip for Paul and Jean ran from March through October 2015, and a Northwest team came in October to help with finishing touches for a new president's home.

The question that confronts Walborns: "When are you going back to the Philippines?"

Margaret Imogene Wright, age 93, died September 12, 2015. She was born on May 17, 1922, in Elkhart, IN. Conversion came at the age of nine, and India then became a reality to her. She graduated from Concord Township High in 1939.

A graduate of Marion College, Marion, IN., she entered nurses training in Swedish Covenant Hospital in Chicago, completing her course in 1950.

Margaret began missionary service with The Wesleyan Church in India, in December 1951. She served in Gujarat state - two years in Dandi by the sea, then in Pardi, and later in Dhagadmar, as a traveling nurse to the dispensaries. In 1958, Margaret moved to Nepal to work in cooperation with the United Mission of Nepal. In 1962, she served as an instructor in the school of nursing, Shanta Bhawan Hospital, in Kathmandu. She received an M.A. in nursing from Ball State University, Muncie, IN, in 1974.

In retirement, Margaret lived in the missionary community at Brooksville Village in Brooksville, FL. She taught Sunday School, was a member of the Wesleyan Women's International, and a life member of the Trained Nurses Association of Nepal.

Funeral services were held for Margaret on September 15, 2015 in the Brooksville Wesleyan Church with interment at the Brooksville cemetery.

Son Jim remembers how when his dad as district superintendent would be gone days on end, his mom would be in charge of the home front and in a foreign country. She was a prayer warrior and kept a prayer journal in precise detail, even to the end of her days. She wanted people to see Christ alive in her life and for others to find this same joy. Any hour of the day or night, she had time to talk and

pray with people. Later, Rev. Nelson pastored churches in Michigan for 40 years.

Survivors include children, Rev. and Mrs. Stephen (Eileen) Nelson, Mr. and Mrs. Mark (Carol) Nelson, and Rev. and Mrs. James (Karen) Nelson; six grandsons and five great-grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Kaye Hart.

were formed to send Latino missionaries to the Fotizo People to work in partnership with Global Partners. They will be recruited, trained and funded in the next 4 years. One young woman from Brazil will be spending a year in Mozambique, Africa.
