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Jesus Film Partnerships



Over the past two years, an increasing number of our international fields with *JESUS* film teams have become self-supporting ministries. This is an encouraging trend from a missional perspective.

Zambia is self-supporting and planted 15 new churches. They have also invested in the western regions of the country of Malawi where a number of churches have started. Mozambique has planted hundreds of churches and now is doing so in the eastern regions of Malawi. Sierra Leone has planted many new churches and is now

sending missionaries with the JESUS film into the country of The Gambia. Many other fields are embracing this challenge and are becoming sending churches.

Think of this progress in 2017:

- 68 new church plants reported
- 93 new preaching points started
- over 63,000 people responded to the gospel message
- 546 cell groups initiated



Do you see the critical need for leadership development? To keep up with the explosive rate of the church globally, we must equip effective pastors, so that these churches will continue to mature and multiply.








Robert and Rebecca Miller (Zambia 1970 to 1980)
