## Portable Bible School Graduation

Bob and Kay **Bickert** returned to the Philippines in October 2017 to set up a School of Evangelism (SOE) in Baguio City. Working with the Wesleyan Director of Educational Institutions, they arranged facilities, set up a board of directors and appointed a SOE Director. Emphasizing discipleship and outreach follow-up, growth has come across the district. Students work among their own people and extend the churches with new church planting. Chris Calya-en, an ordained minister in



Baguio City has not only won new converts, but gone to their home areas. One is the Abatan, Benguet community, two hours north of Baguio. A new church was organized and many new converts are coming to faith in Christ. The Portable Bible School (PBS) courses comprise 200 class hours to equip believers to evangelize and disciple new converts. The first graduation of the PBS occurred December 7 in Abatan and is pictured above. Six months of intensive classes on Saturdays from 9 am to 4 pm completed the first

'Nedra' Van Cleave died October 13, 2019 in Miles City, Montana. She was born to James and Mabel (Armentrout) Ballinger on May 31, 1938 in South Bend, Indiana. After high school, she graduated from Marion College in Marion, IN where she met Paul Van Cleave. They married on August 15, 1963. After teaching school and pastoring, they sensed God's call to missions and moved to Michigan for missionary internship.

From 1973 to 1977, they served as Wesleyan missionaries to the Philippines teaching in the Bible Colleges before settling in Miles City. Nedra taught her children at home and loved serving in the church as



a Sunday school teacher. She also served at Christian Women's Club and attended Bible Studies regularly. She prayed regularly for her children and grandchildren as an example of faith and love.

## Multiplying Leaders for the Nepal Church Through Leadership Training

God is on the move in The Wesleyan Church of Nepal! Their goal is to see that all of their churches are led by pastors who have completed at least six basic pastoral training courses. This past August, Dr. Paul Mills brought his unique teaching skills to Kathmandu for the fourth training class in a series of the six basic courses called the Six Pak.

Approximately 25 Wesleyan churches throughout this country are all led by enthusiastic believers who have little, if any, formal pastoral training. In the past 16



months, four of these intensive classes have been taught by pastors and instructors supplied by Global Partners.

In April, another missional leader taught Wesleyan History and Beliefs. Among the students at that class was a group of church leaders from western Nepal who are applying to join The Wesleyan Church. One of these pastors has a church of some 300 attendees. This church has birthed seven other satellite churches in the Lamahi region.

The August class was taught in a temporary bamboo and tin structure on property that was recently acquired for the purpose of building a permanent pastor training center. Dr. Mills inspired a love for the Word of God and the value of discipling believers with training firmly rooted in the Bible. His teaching was well received.

The final two courses of the Six Pak are expected to be taught in coming months. Nepalese pastors who successfully complete all six classes will be licensed by the Nepal Wesleyan Church. The Nepal Church will soon have trained pastors leading their churches who are passionate about reaching their world for Christ.


## Ellisons In Mongolia....Thanksgiving
