DR. GLENDON R. KIERSTEAD went home to be with his Lord on March 25, 2006. He was born 71 years ago in Plaster Rock, New Brunswick, Canada, His grandparents and parents were missionaries from the Reformed Baptist Church in Canada to South Africa. Dr. Kierstead was an ordained Wesleyan minister having served with the church for 20

years in South Africa. He lived in South Africa for a total of 32 years. After coming back to North America he served in the States as school administrator and pastor until his retirement to Brooksville, Florida.

Dr. Kierstead authored two books: *High Mileage for My Model* and *In Retrospect* –65 *years* –*The History of the Reformed Baptist Church in South Africa*. NOTES FROM YOUR MISSIONARIES

*RUSSIA. Kerry Pickard writes, "One big prayer request is for our Russian Youth Bible Festival (youth camp). It will be held July 30-August 5, 2006. Youth camps have been one of our most effective ministries. Every year we see lives changed and many of our current leaders have come from

our youth camp ministry...Recently a counseling team was in Vladimir. They had a chance to talk with a lot of different people...it sounds like it was really good and that God used them to help many people. There seems to be a new spirit in the Tokareva Church services now. We have been praying for months that God would pour out His Spirit in a new way on the church and it seems He has...Please pray that those whose hearts He touched will remain strong and that the seeds planted will grow."

*RUSSIAN NATIONAL LEADER, PASTOR OLEG AND TONYA (children: Matthew, Mark, Lydia, and Evangelina). Pastor Oleg serves as the pastor of The Wesleyan Church in the city of Ryazan, located four hours south of Vladimir. He is also the chairman of our National Wesleyan Church Board. Oleg is a fiery evangelist and a deep man of God. Please pray that God would continue to keep him humble and grant him discernment, boldness, and compassion as he shepherds the Ryazan church as well as serving the Russian Wesleyan Church at large. *INDONESIA. Keith Norris reports: "I attended the first service of a new church at a complex housing 6 families from Nias Island. These families lost their homes in the March 28th (2005) earthquake. The complex is on the outskirts of Medan, the provincial capital of North Sumatera. It consists of 6 apartments, a two-room school building and a church building. Through World Hope these families are now establishing micro-businesses to support themselves. On Nias Island World Hope International is building a Christian high school to both help people recover from the tsunami and earthquake and to help develop the economy of the small island. Two middle schools that were badly damaged are now being renovated. The schools have given World Hope the use of some of the classroom space to begin the high school. This will allow us to open the school next August (2006) while negotiating for some land to build our own campus. The school will be a vocational school with a two-fold goal: (1) to train students in a trade so they can better support themselves, and (2) to evangelize and disciple the students so they will truly follow Christ...The school superintendent and his wife are graduates from our Wesleyan Bible College in Magelang, Central Java."

*CHILE. "We rejoice with District Superintendent Carlos Martinez, who reports that his daughter Acsa Jireh and niece Damaris were among 21 people recently baptized. One of the young men who was baptized has been a real blessing in that after two years since he accepted Christ, he wanted to be baptized again. He is being used of the Lord in our Children's ministries. In some of our children's crusades he has been the preacher and many children have accepted Christ. Let's pray that many more children will open their hearts to the Lord in the Osorno area of southern Chile."

*PAPUA NEW GUINEA. Jim Keilholtz writes: "God wonderfully answered prayer for our National Conference. We had a wonderful time praying in partnership –a person from one tribe praying with a person from a different tribe. Pastors, in humbleness, asked for prayer and anointing."
