INDIA CALLING!

India is the second largest nation in the world with a population of over 1 BILLION. Many missions have attempted to enter this needy nation to bring the good news of Christ to her millions. Over the years The Wesleyan Church has sent several missionaries to minister to the spiritual and physical needs of this great land. Today there are 60 Wesleyan Churches and 5,553 members located mainly in central, west and northeast India.

One of those missionaries was Miss Rebecca Elizabeth Bibbee. She was born on March 12, 1922 in Wheeling, West Virginia. Her mother died when she was just one month old and she was raised by her uncle and aunt. They didn't attend church, but sent Becky to Sunday school. Becky's life was changed when she was seventeen years old and attending a service where an American Indian was speaking. That was the night

In 1990 she was the spring graduation speaker at Indiana Wesleyan University. She received a standing ovation by the graduates following her challenging message. She was then honored with a Doctor's degree by the university.

For 50 years she served in the country she loved and that loved, revered and appreciated her (Having served under Missionary Bands of the World for 8 years and then under The Wesleyan Church for 42 years.) She officially retired as a missionary to India in 1992. She has made several annual trips back to the country of her calling and that she loved until she was not able to travel due to health issues.

In her last letter from India she wrote: "Leaving India is not leaving a job; it is leaving a life in His dear will which I love. The luxury of life in the USA —no water buckets to lug around... electricity not going off in the midst of a cake, gas in the filling stations, hot dogs in the stores, rugs on the floors —oh, innumerable such daily blessings beckon me, but these many years Jesus has enabled me to keep such nailed to the cross."

MIRACLES IN SUMBA, INDONESIA –THE STORY OF AN OLD SHAMAN.......

The following story from Sumba was told to Dr. John Connor, Director of the JESUS Film ministry: "The team members didn't really trust the old shaman (witch doctor), but he was also the civic leader of his tribe. It was necessary to gain his permission to show the JESUS film. The old shaman (witch doctor) didn't really know why he had agreed to talk with this young Christian pastor who wanted to show a film about Jesus in his village. For decades he and his brothers had stood as a wall against any Christians who wanted to penetrate their villages.

The young man who came was very polite and soft spoken. He believed he could use this naïve Christian to his advantage, so he gave his permission and a day was set to show the film. The team had prayed and fasted for the showing. The old shaman didn't come to the showing. Four of the team members stood at each side of the crowd facing outward. As the film was being shown all four men saw what appeared to be an apparition of the old shaman flying in toward the crowd, but he was frustrated by a wall that appeared to reject him. They realized they were in the midst of spiritual warfare.

The old shaman was frustrated and angry and cursed the young man. The young man was unfazed. The young man then told the old shaman that God had revealed to him that the old shaman would die the following day and he urged him to ask Jesus to forgive and save him.

The day following the old man died. The family called the young pastor. When the young pastor arrived at the bedside the old man opened his eyes and sat up. When he saw the young pastor with fear he asked, 'What has happened to me? Why are you here?' The family was terrified, nothing like had ever happened. The young pastor said he believed the Lord was giving this man a chance to repent, and repent is what he did. Then the old shaman said, 'There are 72 fetishes in my house they need to be destroyed.' So, at his instructions, they were gathered and burned.

That night the pastor was called again, this time to the hospital. When he arrived a son of the old man met him at the door, and said, 'You should not have come. The old man has died and if you enter he will live.' The pastor, however, went in and when he got to the bedside the old

man opened his eyes and in great fear said that he 'couldn't enter the gate.' The pastor said, 'The Lord has revealed to me there is one more fetish which you must give up before you can enter heaven's gate.' The old man replied, 'Yes, there is one more, but I drank it; it is in my body. How can I give it up?' The pastor answered, 'God can do anything. If you are willing to give it up let us pray and God can take it.'

The pastor put his hand under the armpit on the ribs of the old man. As the pastor prayed he felt a power go through his hand and the room tensed as they felt the power swirl and then leave, and the old man was at peace, as he had never before been. He asked to be baptized and someone produced a bottle of drinking water. There in the hospital bed, at peace with God and man, the old shaman was baptized. The next day the old man died and was buried." (This was adapted from an article written by Dr. John Connor).

Dr. Connor then reports this was the opening to a vast group of villages in a remote area of Indonesia that have never been reached by any church. It is also an area where the Muslim religion has not penetrated. Today there are 6 Wesleyan churches, 7 preaching points, and 8 trained lay pastors. At a recent gathering of five of those churches the shamans were present. They are not Christians, yet, but they have encouraged the people who follow them to become Christians and they have taken steps to dissolve their religion. Dr. Connor says, "In my 37 years of mission service and in all the reading I have done in anthropology, I have never heard of a religion that has a known ritual to dissolve that form of worship and belief. But there is one there."

Please join us in praying that a great revival will sweep through the island of Sumba and that many will come to know Christ as their personal Savior. Pray that wisdom from the God of heaven will saturate the spirit of the JESUS film team.

TAIWAN -Bill & Marilyn French report, "Happy New Year! No, we are not late. The Chinese New Year began today, Feb. 7, and the celebration will continue for several days. This is the biggest holiday of the year and everybody celebrates. New Year's Eve, the family visits the wife's mily and on New Year's day they visit the husband's family. The New Year's Eve meal will be the big family meal. For many, this will be hot pot. Hot pot can include

almost anything and everything and many things we can't name! This will also be the time for families and friends to give red envelopes containing money.

In December we held the Christmas Festival in the park. About fifteen churches participated. Our church gave away hundreds of home baked cookies, and hundreds of pieces of literature. We had about a thousand people visit our tables and there were five to six thousand that visited the Festival. In the follow-up, some of the churches reported contacts and conversions. We praise the Lord for this witness.

PHILIPPINES –A new house church in Batangan, Valencia City, Bukidnon added new members as a result of the JESUS film ministry. The lack of a church building caused some of the zone pastors to give their year-end bonuses to pay for the down payment for a church lot. CAMBODIA –Tim & Tiffany Gallant report; "Recently one of our Bible school staff had a fire in his community. We got the call just asking us to come and help. By the time we got there, 18 houses had burned to the ground, but God had miraculously spared Kim Sua's house. Kim Sua and those of us from the Bible school were able to help his neighbors during this very difficult time.

NICARAQUA –Mike and Amy Knox write that Connie had a dream that someone had given her a boat load of shoes to sell. She shared the dream with her family and some friends. When they would meet, Connie would say, "I'm still waiting for my shoes!" So when Mike delivered about 100 pairs of shoes to her a few days later, it was a surprise but not totally unexpected. NOTES OF VICTORY FROM AROUND THE WORLD BRAZIL/GUYANA/PARAMAKATOI—Holly & Derek Atkinson, GO-Net missionaries report that they were invited to Guyana and Paramakatoi to assist in the youth retreat. There were about 300 young people who attended. Many walked for hours. Derek was the featured speaker. He also led 3 seminars. During the afternoons they youth played volleyball, kickball and soccer. In the evenings they had evangelistic services and showed two films. During the extended weekend of ministry there were 30 who made commitments for Christ.

SHUNEM MINISTRIES –Jim and Jeanette Vermilya are serving as directors for this ministry located in the Indianapolis area. The home has provided a "home away from home" for over 300 missionaries and their families during the past two years. Some were MK's whose parents live abroad and some were re-connecting after years apart. They say, "It has been a joy to minister to people we know well and also to serve those we have never met."

AUSTRALIA –During the National Conference former missionary Lindsay Cameron was elected as national superintendent replacing retiring Stan Baker. Dr. Steve DeNeff's preaching was anointed and many lives were touched.

The conference also upheld the decision to sell the Kingsley College property. They will establish a relationship with Tabor College for the major courses. Kingsley will function as a facilitator for Wesleyan ministerial students. Kingsley will also establish Wesley study centers for tutoring in ministry preparation and Wesleyan distinctives.

NEW ZEALAND -Tina Ridley from the New Zealand church went as a short term missionary to Guatemala. Tina is an occupational therapist. Occasionally an open field was the examination room and 3 chairs the table!
