# DISCIPLES MAXING DISCIPLES

In September, for the first time, our team in Brno, Czech Republic, hosted a training on how to share our faith naturally with friends, family, and co-workers. The training was not "an American thing." It was completely created and led by Czechs! It was powerful for Czechs to hear from their own national brothers

and sisters how sharing their faith is necessary and possible. Especially inspiring was hearing the trainers' stories of showing value to a neighbor or friend, which led to a spiritual conversation, and, in turn, led to starting a small group Bible study.

The training gave simple and reproducible tools, like a 15-second testimony of what God has done in our life, a very basic image explaining God's story, or a model of Bible study that doesn't need a leader or extra material. These tools means the participants at the training have an easy time memorizing and practicing them while teaching others.

Vera Ruth Stair Klatt, 96, passed away Dec. 9, 2019 in Bluffton, Indiana. She was born to Harry and Lillie Beyler Stair on Oct. 8, 1923, in Plymouth.

Vera was married to Robert Wesley Klatt by the Rev. C. C. Decker. Bob and Vera served as Wesleyan missionaries in the Philippines briefly in the late 1970's, teaching in the Rosales Wesleyan Bible College.

Klatts are best loved pastoring churches in the Wesleyan Church – serving in Indiana, New York, Illinois, and Michigan from the mid 1940's through 2007, when Bob assisted as calling pastor with Senior Pastor Ollie Dongell at the Plymouth Church.

A Celebration of Vera's life took place December 15, 2019 in Plymouth with Pastor Ed Friberg officiating. Burial followed in the Hepton Union Cemetery in Nappanee on Dec. 16, 2019.

## Explosion in Mission Discipleship

Every two years, the Ibero-America Conference gathers for the biannual JIBACAM\* Congress. This congress and the mission coordinators' meeting are key opportunities to teach and disciple people in missions. Our goal has been to have 200 people attend one of these events.

This last year, we were hopeful about reaching this goal until two countries had political upheaval, and there were visa issues with others. Still, we had one of the best events ever with a key focus in ministry to the Muslim world.

Then came COVID-19 and more restrictions on movement. However, it didn't stop the JIBACAM Missions Board from developing an entirely new approach to discipling people in missions. It is called Conversations Live on Facebook with key guests to talk about missions. The people reached with the first one was almost 3,000. The last one reached almost 6,000 people. People are learning about missions and getting involved.

# Pioneer Missionary Bios

#### **Charles & Elizabeth Carter**

Charles Webb Carter was born May 14, 1905, in Southport, Indiana. His family moved to lowa when he was six. One evening after the preaching, he told his sister Hazel that he intended to become a preacher. At the age of 16, he was saved and again heard distinctly the Master's call. He enrolled in Dakota Wesleyan University in Mitchell, South Dakota to prepare for the ministry. He was licensed to preach in the Wesleyan Church and went through Dakota and lowa holding revival services.

He completed a three year course in God's Bible School in Cincinnati, Ohio and there met Elizabeth Hutchinson. She was born April 29, 1902 in Startle, Ohio. A lasting impression of her childhood was to dress her dolls as Indian, Chinese, and other nations as the audience. Her life work acted out her child's play as a "Missionary." Another memory was of a friend who came to her after praying at the altar to say, "Elizabeth, if you don't get saved you'll go to Hell." She flew to the altar but held on to the desire to do what was right for peace with God. She studied for a business degree and then went to God's Bible School. She and Charles were married on June 7, 1928.

After a few months pastorate at Winchester, Ohio, they visited family members and sailed on the "West Kedron" from New York City in 1928. They completed three terms with Wesleyan Missions in Africa. In Bendembu, the people were unresponsive until a noted sorcerer, Pa Sugo, was converted. Rev. Carter won the heart of the chief in Bendembu when he helped lay out the streets and plan for the complete rebuilding of the town. They also served in the capital of Freetown. They were happy to see the conversion of Chief Dura at the annual conference in 1943.

He was born in New York City and she in Miles City, Montana. They met in East St. Louis as camp counselors for inner city children. He became a Christian at a Methodist youth meeting and she came to Christ as a young child. He did a stint in the military and became an instructor completing before ministerial studies Bartlesville Wesleyan College. The two boys were born there and they moved to Carmel, Indiana to be on staff as Youth Pastor. They departed in August 1982 for Zimbabwe, Africa where they were involved in church planting and Theological Education by Extension training.

..... Last issue we featured Phil and Becky Davis currently teaching at Asia-Pacific Nazarene Theological Seminary in Manila. Phil teaches theology and Becky teaches worship and music. Their sons: Matthew, Jeremy, Ryan, and Jonathan.

Following missionary service, Dr. Carter taught 45 years in two universities in the U.S.A. and five universities overseas. He authored numerous theological texts and was the general editor of the 6 volume Wesleyan Bible Commentary and writer of six of the Biblical books in the set first published in 1964. He wrote of their experiences in Africa in his book Transformed Africans (Wesleyan Methodist Publishing Association, 1938).
