Rev. John Croft, Jesus Film Director

John Croft grew up in Suriname, South America and the Cayman Islands as a MK. He received a bachelor's in Religious Education from God's Bible School and College in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1984, and a master's in Christian Education from Indiana Wesleyan University in 1994.

John is an ordained minister in The Wesleyan Church, serving ten years as pastor of the Wesleyan church in Falmouth, KY. In 1994 John, with his wife, Shanda, and their three children, followed the Lord's leading to pioneer the work of Global Partners and The

Wesleyan Church in the Czech Republic. John served as the field director and involved himself in ministries of teaching English as a second language,

building and developing the Lighthouse Ministry Center (Majak), and for ten seasons as the head football coach for the Brno Alligators (a semi-pro football team).

In 2006 John and his family returned to the states where John served as the director of Missionary Funding with Global Partners. His role was trainer and coach to missionaries in process of team building.

John assumed the position of director of the *JESUS* Film Partnership of Global Partners on January 1, 2013. John's vision is to equip, train, and empower national leaders for the purpose of reaching their own cultures, people groups, and nations with the transforming message of Jesus. John's wife, Shanda, is a registered nurse. They have three children: Travis, Brooke, and Rachel.

Rev. Richard T. Brunk 1928 -- 2013

Richard Brunk went home to be with the Lord on January 16, 2013. He was born in Newtonsville, Ohio, on June 3, 1928, to Thomas Leroy Brunk and Alma Mae Gaskins, the third child of two girls and four boys. Richard grew up in Cincinnati, Ohio, and was married to Charlotte Louise Ammerman on June 17, 1949. He is survived by Charlotte, one daughter, two sons, nine grandsons, and twenty great-grandchildren. Richard graduated from Hamline University in Minneapolis, Minnesota, in 1950 and Hamma Divinity School in 1956. He attended Asbury College and Seminary in Wilmore, Kentucky.

Richard was ordained as an elder in the Methodist Church in 1956 and pastored churches in Ohio: Reedsville, Dunkinsville, Peebles, and Lancaster; and Sauk Centre, Minnesota. In 1961 Richard and Charlotte went



to Costa Rica and Honduras, Central America, as missionaries with World Gospel Mission. In 1967 they returned to the US, and Richard became professor of Missions and Philosophy at Vennard College in University Park, Iowa. In 1973 Richard became vice-president of World Gospel Mission in Marion, Indiana, and served there until 1980. He pastored Riverside Independent Church in Jackson, Mississippi, from 1980 until 1986 and Faith Wesleyan Church in Jackson from 1986 until 1988. In 1988 The Wesleyan Church sent Richard and Charlotte to Puerto Rico as missionaries, where Richard served as field director until 1993. Returning home, he pastored various Wesleyan churches from 1993 until retirement in 2002. Also in Richard's career, he taught in various colleges, universities, and seminaries around the world, preparing young people for Christian ministry. His life was dedicated to his Lord and Church. He loved his Lord, his Family and his Church.

Ms. Uta Lodeen Chase 1922 -- 2013



Uta Lodeen Chase, a former missionary and Kingswood University staff member, passed away at the age of 91 on February 16, 2013, in Fredericton, New Brunswick. A memorial service was held February 20 at Journey Wesleyan Church in Fredericton.

Converted in her early twenties, Uta joined the staff of Holiness Bible Institute, now known as Kingswood University. While working there, she heard a visiting missionary say, "The very sense of the need is enough to take you around the world for Christ." God used the words of this visiting missionary to challenge Uta, and she went to her room to pray. "Before my knees had touched the floor, I knew I was going to Africa!" said Chase.

To prepare for ministry, Uta studied and graduated as a registered nurse in 1950. In February 1951 the District Mission Board appointed Uta to accompany the late Nina Smith Haywood to service in South Africa.

For twenty-six years Ms. Chase served as a medical missionary in Africa, working first at Altona Mission in South Africa, then at Bethesda Mission Hospital in Zimbabwe, and lastly, as the school nurse at Choma Secondary

School in Zambia. On her furloughs from missionary service, she worked at Kingswood University. Her ministry in Africa came to a conclusion in 1977 due to health concerns, and she returned to Canada where she served on staff at the college until her retirement in 1989.

During retirement, Uta willingly volunteered and spent hours in intercessory prayer. Keenly interested in young people, she prayed for them by name and for many others written in her prayer book. Uta Chase will long be remembered as a humble servant of God and woman of faith.

Mrs. Mary Faith Jennings 1921 -- 2012

Mrs. Mary Faith Jennings passed away unexpectedly on Dec. 12, 2012. She was the widow of Dr. Lowell Jennings, who practiced medicine in Gastonia, North Carolina. Mary Faith was born December 9, 1921, in Gastonia, North Carolina.

The Jennings served in medical missions in India and Sierra Leone, Africa, from 1952 to 1954, and 1958 to 1961. Mary Faith willingly helped her husband, whether on the mission field, across the North Carolina District, at the Wesleyan headquarters in Indianapolis, or on the Southern Wesleyan University campus. She found her own special calling and ministry.

Not only was she a faithful wife and partner in ministry, Mrs. Jennings was the mother of two sons and two daughters. She was also a grandmother and great grand-mother. Her daughter Janene Bryson, serves on the North Carolina West District Board of Administration and her grandson Scott Bryson is the director of Music for Kannapolis First Wesleyan.

Her funeral service was held December 15 at Brevard Wesleyan Church, Brevard, North Carolina, with burial in Gastonia, North Carolina at Oakwood Cemetery.
