Aryanne brought updates from the church in Brazil and friends and family. Then Sally shared from her well-worn Portuguese Bible. They even had a chance to video call Aryanne's family in Brazil.

in Manaus, but she had not forgotten them. She recalls how they learned language, invested in her parents, ministered with tenacity, and related to Brazilians with kindness and love.

She has served as missionary in Mozambique and led many short-term trips to East Timor, Mozambique, Guyana and the U.S. Under her direction, the Wesleyan Church of Brazil plans to send their first missionary couple to Bangladesh this year. We serve a God who can do immeasurably more. My team led an English camp, and we saw



God's abundant provision. Stormy weather was forecast, but we had sunny skies before the rain fell each afternoon. Twelve students showed up the first day, and the camp ended with twenty-eight active participants. They were so excited and begged us to stay longer. I was overwhelmed by the incredible work of God in just a few days' time. This was the first camp in that area; our team hopes to provide educational resources and the gospel

message to every community in the region. God opened the door for a long-term worker to connect with a local high school teacher who is excited about working with the team in the future. 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Missionary Bio

A reporter for a Guyanese Newspaper interviewed Doris Wall in 2003. It is quite extensive and I find it fascinating. Here is a sample:

In January of 1967 a young, romantic missionary nurse arrived in a Guyana where the lights from the Independence celebrations the previous year were still up.... ever since Doris was eight years old she wanted to be a missionary nurse.... Her family were regular church-goers, and she practically grew up in the Wesleyan church.... She had always wanted to work in the Amazon Basin, but it was the Wesleyan Mission Board that chose Guyana as her country of service.... after graduation she studied for a Diploma in Nursing. Then she was sent to Guyana.... A week after arriving... Doris was sent to a very small Carib-speaking village at the end of an airstrip, cut off from everywhere except by plane. As nurse she was the only medical person in the area.

This month's missionary grew up on a farm in PA, learning to milk the cows, drive the tractor, and etc. She attended one-room schools until high school, riding the school bus to a nearby town. She sensed a call to missions while studying for her B.S. in Bible at Eastern Pilgrim College. Additional studies were had at Kutztown State Teachers College (now Kutztown State University). After teaching for three years, she was appointed by the Wesleyan Church to Zambia, Africa. For one term she taught sixth and seventh graders at Chababoma Mission School, followed by a term at Jembo Bible School. Later she served as secretary for the mission coordinator. When visitors came to Zambia to see the work of Wesleyan Missions, she was not thinking that one of them would be her future husband. Back in the States they met again when they attended the same church, and interest grew between them. She worked in the Wesleyan World Missions office until they were married in October 1983, and they have been serving the Lord together since that time.
