Rick & Mayra West-Miranda-edited by JE God opened a door of continued service in this Wesleyan desert of North East Florida. Since there is only one Haitian church 45 minutes away, next closet English or Hispanic WC is 1.5 hours away, I chose to attend a small Hispanic Church of God Cleveland, TN, in Saint Augustine, FL. There were only about a dozen people, but both the Pastor & the People welcomed me to participate in every area of the church without being a member including serving on the LBA. I started a Sunday school for kids, 3-10 years old. Two of my granddaughters attended. The church grew over the next couple of years in spite of the COVID pandemic ^(C). The church became my church family.

During this time I took an interest in Pastor and District Superintendent, Mayra Miranda of Puerto Rico. We were engaged on her 65th birthday December 7, 2021. So, I left Saint Augustine, FL for Puerto Rico. Shortly after, we were married on May 28, 2022. We remained there for 8 months, before moving to our home in Saint Augustine in January 2023.

Since we arrived in Saint Augustine, we joined the Iglesia Anastasia Hispanic Church about 20 minutes from our house. Pastor Gregorio would come to our house every Tuesday for 10 weeks for coffee, discipleship and sharing the vision of the church. He knew we will not be joining the church, but still wants us to be involved in every area of church ministry where we feel called to serve. We are part of a small group Bible Study that meets on Wednesday evenings in different homes in nearby neighborhoods. We began studying the Pentateuch a year ago; covering one chapter a day, with a guide, then having discussions on Wednesday evenings. It is a tremendous time.

On Saturdays the Church distributes groceries to 150-175 families who come to the church to pick them up. Mayra & I are part this amazing ministry which includes an offer of evangelism and prayer for each person. There is an average of 35-40 volunteers each Saturday from our church and others.

I was asked by the assistant Pastor to be his mentor. We meet once a month. Pastor Nelson spent 20 years on the beat for NYPD. Mayra & I are also discipling others using the guide provided by the church. Mayra discipled a lady from Cuba, and I'm discipling a man from Peru. The congregation of 100-120 are from nearly every country in Ibero-America including Spain. We also serve as ushers once or twice a month. Actually this ministry is quite involved and takes 2-3 hours, an hour before service, during the 1.5hr service and 1-2hrs after service. We enjoy serving.

On one occasion while I was in the hospital receiving treatment for cancer, I came down with the RSV virus, and had to be quarantined. Since pastors & people could not visit me as they had done in the past, they did a Google Meet prayer meeting. As one of the men, a founder of the church, prayed, "Lord in the 16 years of our church there has never been a couple who has influenced our church in a more positive way than Rick & Mayra." We were shocked; I didn't know what he meant. We had coffee a few days later and I asked him about it. He said: "Rick, you and Mayra are examples of authentic Christians, and there are so few today." We are still shocked, but with the realization that it is a joy to serve the Most High God.

Mayra & I also serve the FL District Mission Coordinators since last July. The FL District is focusing on: Colombia, Cuba, Guyana and Haiti. Mayra & I thank God that in retirement; we continue to be open to ministry opportunities. *~Rick & Mayra West-Miranda*
